

...is an established subject at A Level. Teaching staff are enthusiastic and passionate about the subject. We have had a 100% pass rate at A Level for over 10 years. The course is particularly interesting for students who have noticed how social class, gender, ethnicity disability and age impact on life chances.

A Level Sociology follows the AQA specification.

Theories (the fundamental ideas sociologists have about how society impacts behaviour) **and methods** (the ways they find out about behaviour) are studies throughout the course with a basic introduction at the start of the course and then more detailed revisits throughout.

Paper 1 - 2-hour exam on Education, Methods in Context and Theories and Methods.

This topic includes;

the role and functions of the education system, differential educational achievement of social groups by social class, gender and ethnicity, relationships and processes within schools, the significance of educational policies, the impact of globalisation on educational policy.

Paper 3 - 2-hour exam on Crime and Deviance and Theories and Methods.

The Crime and Deviance topic includes;

crime, deviance, social order and social control, the social distribution of crime and deviance by ethnicity, gender and social class, globalisation and crime in contemporary society; the media and crime; green crime; human rights and state crimes, crime control, surveillance, prevention and punishment, victims, and the role of the criminal justice system and other agencies.

Paper 2 - 2-hour exam on Families and Households and Belief Systems

The Families and Households topic includes;

the relationship of the family to the social structure and social change, changing patterns of marriage, cohabitation, separation, divorce, childbearing and the life course, gender roles, domestic labour and power relationships within the family, the nature of childhood, and changes in the status of children, demographic trends in the United Kingdom since 1900

The Media topic includes;

New media and an understanding of the role of the media in contemporary society; the relationship between ownership and control of the media; the media, globalisation and popular culture; processes of selection and presentation of the content of the news; media representations of age, social class, ethnicity, gender, sexuality and disability; the relationship between the media, their content and presentation, and audiences.

What are the entry requirements?

It is essential that you have at least 5 GCSE's, grades 5 or above. It is helpful if English, History/Geography, Media Studies or RE have been studied successfully. An interest in current affairs and the world around you is advised.



What other subjects link well?

The subject goes well with Health and Social Care, English, Media Studies, Psychology, Law, Politics, History and Geography.
