It is not known exactly when Tom Barlow went to the school or when he joined the army however, it is mentioned that his residence was at the Barony and that he enlisted in Liverpool and was first in the Cheshire Regiment before being transferred to the 10th battalion of the Kings (Liverpool) Regiment. The regiment was mobilised for war and went over to the port of Le Havre on the 2nd of November 1914 they took part in the Winter Operations of 1914-1915. On the 16th of February 1916 the Division relieved the French 88th Division south of Arras and in late July moved to the Somme taking over the front line near the village of Guillemont, they saw action in the battle of Guillemont, Battle of Ginchy, The Battle of Flers-Courcelette and the Battle of Morval. The Division moved to Flanders in October 1916 and took over the front line between Wieltje and Railway Wood. In 1917 they were in action at Pilkem Ridge during the Third Battle of Ypres. It was at the start of this battle on the 31st of July 1917 that he sadly was killed at the rank of Lieutenant Corporal.

It is not known exactly when Wilfred Cope went to the school although its likely between 1901-1906. In WW1 he joined the 9th Battalion of the Rifle Brigade at the age of 24 he enlisted at St. Paul's Churchyard, Middx. On the 21st of August 1914, the Brigade was raised at Winchester. They trained at Aldershot, moving to Petworth in November, returning to Aldershot in February 1915 for final training. On the 19th of May 1915 they landed at Boulogne fighting at the Action of Hooge, being the first division to be attacked by flamethrowers. They further were in action in the Second Attack on Bellewarde and in 1916 they fought on the Somme seeing action in The Battle of Delville Wood and the Battle of Flers-Courcelette. Unfortunately, on the 5th of October 1916 he was killed in action in Flanders field at the age of 26.

Charles Foster enlisted in the 8th Battalion of The Royal Welsh Fusiliers at Rochdale and in September 1914 his Brigade moved to Chiseldon and Cirencester. Near the end of February the Division concentrated at Blackdown in Hampshire. They moved to the Mediterranean from the 13th of June 1915 landing at Alexandria then moving to Mudros, by the 4th of July to prepare for a landing at Gallipoli. The infantry landed on Cape Helles between the 6th and 16th of July to relieve 29th Division. They returned to Mudros at the end of the month, and the entire Division landed at ANZAC Cove between the 3rd and 5th of August. They were in action in The Battle of Sari Bair, The Battle of Russell's Top and The Battle of Hill 60, at ANZAC. Soon afterwards they transferred from ANZAC to Suvla Bay. They were evacuated from Suvla on the 19th and 20th of December 1915, and after a weeks rest they moved to the Helles bridgehead. They were in action during the last Turkish attacks at Helles on the 7th of January 1916 and were evacuated from Helles on the 8th and 9th. The Division concentrated at Port Said, holding forward posts in the Suez Canal defences. On the 12th of February 1916 they moved to Mesopotamia, to join the force being assembled near Sheikh Sa'ad for the relief of the besieged garrison at Kut al Amara. They joined the Tigris Corps on the 27th of March and were in action in the unsuccessful attempts to relieve Kut including the actions fought at Hanna, Fallahiya, and Sanniyat. After taking the first two, the 13th Division was stopped by the Turkish forces under the overall command of Khalil Pasha at the Battle of the Sanniyat on 9 April 1916. They were in action in The Battle of Kut al Amara, the capture of the Hai Salient and at the first assault of Khadairi Bend is the likely the battle in which he lost his life.

Gunner Louis Henry Forster who joined the Royal Garrison Artillery in Crewe, died of his wounds on July 14, 1918 aged 33, at home. He was buried at Nantwich General Cemetery, Cheshire, England (A. 633 Son of Henry and Esther Forster of Station View, Nantwich and husband of Lillie Forster (nee Ratcliffe) of 7, Victoria Buildings, Pall Mall, Nantwich, whom he married on December 9, 1911. A former pupil at Nantwich and Acton Grammar School from around 1896-1901 and before the war was a general painter, having served an apprenticeship under Mr Cooper. He enlisted December 8, 1915 and embarked from Folkestone for France (Boulogne) on September 9, 1916. According to casualty reports, when coming out of a dugout, he heard a wounded comrade calling out his name and asking for water. About to oblige the man, a shell fell nearby. This happened at Arras on May 25, 1917 and he was invalided home on June 9, with multiple wounds and fractures. Admitted to the Duchess of Connaught Canadian Red Cross Hospital at Taplow, Buckinghamshire two days later. He died at 6.00pm on July 14, 1918 from an embolism.

Charles Griffiths enlisted in the 1/1st Cheshire Yeomanry (Earl of Chester's) who were a Territorial unit, part of the Welsh Border Mounted Brigade at Nantwich. In March 1916 they travelled to Egypt. In 1917 his unit was merged with the $1/1^{st}$ Shropshire Yeomanry and redesignated the 10^{th} Battalion Shropshire Light Infantry. On the 10^{th} of March his unit which had been assigned to the 74th (Yeomanry) Division's attack was assigned to astride the Jerusalem to Nablus road; the 231st Brigade on the right moving towards Mezra ash Sherqiye 1.5 miles (2.4 km) north west of Tell 'Asur. But the difficult night advance was further complicated by the terrain and Ottoman machine guns and despite reinforcements being brought forward, the infantry were held up later in the day by the cavernous gorge of the Wadi el Jib. At some point during this day he was killed in action in a land 2,300 miles away from home.

Precisely when Frederick Pedley enlisted at Macclesfield is unknown but at the time of his death he was a member of the 15th (1st Birkenhead) Battalion, Cheshire Regiment which was raised at Birkenhead as a Bantam Battalion on the 18th of November 1914 by Alfred Bigland MP. Bantam Battalions were those which admitted troops who were under the normal regulation minimum height of 5 feet 3 inches.

After initial training close to home, they moved to Hoylake. In June 1915 they joined 105th Brigade, 35th Division at Masham, North Yorkshire. The Battalion was adopted by the War Office on the 15th of August 1915 and they moved to Salisbury Plain for final training. They were ordered to Egypt in late 1915, but the order was soon cancelled and they proceeded to France in the last week of January 1916, landing at Le Havre and the division concentrated east of St Omer. They were in action during the Battles of the Somme at Bazentin Ridge, Arrow Head Copse, Maltz Horn Farm and Falfemont Farm. The division received new drafts of men to replace losses suffered on the Somme. In 1917 they were in action during the pursuit to the Hindenburg Line, at Houthulst Forest and The Second Battle of Passchendaele where he unfortunately lost his life on the second day of the assault.

Walter Riley potentially joined the 16th (Church Lads Brigade) Battalion, King's Royal Rifle Corps which was raised at Denham, Buckinghamshire on the 19th of September 1914 by Field-Marshal Lord Grenfell, Commandant of the Church Lads Brigade. After initial training close to home they moved to Rayleigh in March then returned to Denham in May. They joined 100th Brigade, 33rd Division at Clipstone Camp in June 1915 and moved to Perham Down for final training in August. They proceeded to France on the 17th of November landing at Le Havre. 33rd Division concentrated near Morbecque, being strengthened by the exchange of 98th Brigade for the experienced 19th Brigade from 2nd Division. It is not known how or where exactly he lost his life although it can be presumed that he was injured in a previous engagement and potentially was transferred to the unit while he was injured.

It is unknown when Walter Wright went to the School or what they did during their time there. Nor when he joined the army but his division the 1st Battalion, Cheshire Regiment at the outbreak of war was a regular unit of the British Army and was in Londonderry when war broke out in August 1914 with 15th Brigade in 5th Division. They sailed from Belfast to France to join the British Expeditionary Force, landing at Le Havre on the 16th of August 1914. They saw action at The Battle of Mons, The Battle of the Marne, The Battle of the Aisne, The Battles of La Bassee, at Messines and in The First Battle of Ypres. Between the 3rd of March and 7th of April 1915 they were attached with 15th Brigade to 28th Division in in exchange for 83rd Brigade in order to familiarise the newly arrived troops with the Western Front. In 1915 they were in action in The Second Battle of Ypres and the Capture of Hill 60. In March 1916 they took over a sector in the front line in the southern edge of Vimy Ridge, in front of Arras. The 5th Division arrived on the Somme to relieve the British units who had suffered badly in the attack on the first of July and went into action at High Wood, being withdrawn in October. The Division spent late Autumn and winter near Festubert and in 1917 were in action in the Battles of Arras and the Third Battle of Ypres. J. A. Hamilton attended the School approximately between 1931-1936, during his time with the School he was on the School Football team and won the School colours as a goalkeeper and in his final year he served as vice-House Captain for Wilbraham House coming tied second in the Boys 100 yard race in 1936, during his time at the School his nickname was "Big Ham" and during his time at School was described as an outstanding boy who in his 1936 examinations got a Distinction in English. His brother also attended the school between approximately 1934-1939. It is unclear when he joined the army but even in his days at School had made up his mind to be a soldier and he joined the army before the beginning of the war and was in the Scots Guards before being commissioned to the Royal N. Lancs at the beginning of the War. After service in France and Belgium, he was in the evacuation at Dunkirk. He was later in the thick of the fighting in N. Africa with his brother however they were separated when he was injured and returned to Britain and visited the School and Italy and for conspicuous gallantry in the landing at Anzio Beach, he received the M.C. He was reportedly held in the very highest esteem by his comrades, both British and Greek and was in all things a fine soldier who "played the game" to the end.

At the time of his death, he was a lieutenant of the Notts. S. R. Yeomanry and was killed in action on June 9th three days after D Day. Previously, he had seen service in Greece and Cyrenaica reportedly fighting hard all the time, and latterly in Normandy, where he laid down his life. It was reported in the Port Sunlight News "In his life and in his death may he be an inspiration to us who live on." He was survived by his parents who also were very engaged in the school's activities and awards days.
